


Methods of collecting feedback

- Public Comment
- Online Survey
- Key conversations with community organizations/stakeholders
- Polling

Online Survey: 11/14 thru 12/1

- 457 responses (92% from people living in NM)
- Responses from all NM Counties but two (Harding; Hidalgo)
- 55% Male; 43% Female; 1% Non-binary; 2% other or Non-conforming
- 66% White; 44% Non-White
- Tribe, Pueblo or Sovereign Nation Affiliation: Tesuque; Coahuilteca; Grande Ronde; Qawalangin; Santa Clara; Slapahoe; Genizaro; Osage; Cherokee; Cheyenne River Souix; Jemez; Navajo; Yankton Sioux; Acoma.





Other barriers:

- Water rights/Water access
- Local zoning & ordinances
- Banking & Federal Law
- No help to encourage and assist small farmers
- Navigating internal state agencies
- Micro-licensees being held to same level of regulations as large licensees
- Big marijuana already has a head start

- Access to education in rural areas of the state
- Wages
- Having a federally legal income

Other qualifying criteria

- Caregiver/spouse to a disabled Veteran
- Living in a boom or bust community, i.e. mining
- Minority woman on disability
- Person with a disability
- Have been evicted from public housing due to cannabis use
- Small farmer/distressed farmer
- Identify as a person of color
- 1st time business owner
- Over the age of 55
- Have significant amount of student loan debt

Other strategies

- Require non-micro licensees to pay a living wage and provide benefits
- Allow for co-op approaches
- Incentives to have a high % of investors or revenue remain in NM
- Access to commercial water rights for micro's
- License type for non-store front businesses that offer pop-up functions; delivery;
- Lower gross receipts taxes
- Utilize tax revenue for reparations fund for those & direct family of those impacted by marijuana arrests, convictions, evictions
- Outreach to small farmers
- Offset costs of mandatory expenses like Biotrack
- Navigator program to assist in the application and start-up phase
- Dedicated staff to ensure non-micro licensees are complying with their equity plans
